Getting Started

7. Pause videos to repeat words.
8. Encourage children to speak along.
9. Rewatch lessons during the week.

10. Ask questions after each video.



Making the Most of Worksheets

11. Print worksheets ahead of time.
 12. Add stickers or stamps for fun.
 13. Let kids color while reviewing.
 14. Display finished work.
 15. Turn worksheet content into review games.

Craft with Language in Mind

16. Talk through vocabulary while crafting.
 17. Label parts of the craft in French.
 18. Encourage French descriptions of the creation.
 19. Display crafts all week.
 20. Photograph crafts to create a portfolio.

Fun French Games

21. Use matching cards for vocabulary.
22. Play “Jacques a dit” (Simon Says).
23. Organize French scavenger hunts.

24. Act out vocabulary in charades.

25. Freeze dance to French songs.

Practice Speaking & Listening

26. Say 5 French words at breakfast.

27. Record your child speaking French.

28. Use toys to roleplay conversations.

29. Play age-appropriate, clean French music during playtime.

30. Watch age-appropriate French videos.

Reinforce & Review

31. Create flashcards with key words.

32. Set up a French word wall.

33. Mix new and old vocabulary into games.

34. Rewatch favorite lessons as rewards.

35. Use a sticker chart for progress.

Learn Together

36. Practice words together as a family.

37. Include siblings or friends in activities.
 38. Label common household items.
 39. Say French blessings at meals.
 40. Cook simple French recipes.

Stay Consistent

41. Follow a weekly schedule (e.g., Lesson Monday, Worksheet Tuesday...).
 42. Keep sessions under 20 minutes.
 43. Alternate activities to stay fresh.
 44. Celebrate learning milestones.
 45. Keep a French supply box ready.

Make it Meaningful

46. Talk about French-speaking cultures.
 47. Add French songs or Bible verses.
 48. Let children “teach” what they’ve learned.
 49. Remind them learning French is a superpower!
 50. Stay positive—progress matters more than perfection.
